

68.9 Million Americans have a disability People of Color are significantly more likely to have a disability

50% of people living in poverty are disabled

>> SLIDE 8: The State of Entrepreneurship in 2023

- 33 Mn Entrepreneurs employ over 61 Mn people
- Surging new business applications from 2020-2022. In 2023- 5.5Mn applications filed.
- 99.9% of businesses in the US are small businesses; 43.5% of entire US GDP
- 8 out of 10 businesses do not have any employees

>> SLIDE 9: Growing Independent Workers

- There are 64 Mn freelancers in the US (38% of the workforce)
- Contributing 1.27 Trillion to the US economy
- 47% of all freelancers provide knowledge services such as computer programming, marketing, IT, and business consulting in 2023.
- Gen Z & Millennials are more likely to be freelancers

People with disabilities are **2x as likely** to be self-employed as those living without a disability.

- Education is focused on limited skill development
- No clear career paths
- Higher education is very limited

- Choices limited by health, illness, loss of insurance, and physical limitations
- Requires them to sacrifice their health in order to work
- Lack of opportunities for savings and earnings
- Limited capital to launch businesses
- Forces them into labor-intensive industries

- No interaction with larger business community
- Lack of guidance
- Segregation by socialization


